

#### **Director's Notes**

First, I wish to thank The Brookfield Theatre for the Arts for giving me another opportunity to direct at this wonderful theater. And, too, for the joy in being able to put on this production of one of my all-time favorite plays. I am blessed with an exceptional cast and crew who all seem to love this play as much as I do. And that's important when presenting an obscure play such as this and I hope theatre go-ers will enjoy our presentation and come away feeling like it was worth every penny they spent. Now a little bit about the play. Outward Bound was written in 1924 by playwright Sutton Vane (born 1888) who started out his career as an actor. He was the son of an author and playwright of the same name. Vane's play Outward Bound, a fantasy-drama, was so unusual in its subject matter that no producer would go near it. He ended up producing it himself, building the set, bringing together the company of actors, all for the mere sum of \$600. The play, running during post-World War I England, with its reflective, pacifist mood, struck a responsive chord and was an immediate success. Outward Bound provoked endless discussion and arguments about its meaning. It was updated during World War II in the form of a movie titled Between Two Worlds.

The music I have chosen to run pre-show and intermission is also obscure in that it was written and performed by Ernesto Lecuona (born in 1895) who was the most important musician in Cuban musical life during the first half of the 20th Century. All the musical pieces were written by Lecuona during the 1920s. If interested, you can get the CD titled Lecuona plays Lecuona: The Ultimate Collection.
