Biographies

Noël Desiato (Katharine Hepburn) is thrilled to make her debut at The Brookfield Theatre for the Arts and would like to give a special thank you to Alicia Dempster and the entire Board of the theatre for such a warm welcome. Noël has previously performed Tea at Five at The Sherman Playhouse, Tri-Arts and at TheatreWorks, where the production originated. Other credits include Suddenly Last Summer, Medea, The Laramie Project, Holiday Memories, Love Letters, One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, Terra Nova and The Rainmaker in Rock Island, IL. Film and television credits include a short called Man's Best Friend (HBO), On Thin Ice (which was shown at The Thaila Theatre in NYC), Splatter University (directed by Richard W. Haines), Getting Personal (opposite John Shea) and a mini-series for Chinese National Television entitled Our Children Abroad. Noël is a graduate of The Stella Adler Conservatory and was a member of Michael Moriarty's Potters Field Theatre Company in NYC.

"I personally would like to dedicate this production to all our friends who can't make it out here anymore. A huge thank you to my director Jane Farnol for her tremendous insight and generosity. Also thanks to Joseph Russo and Bill Hughes, whose contribution is invaluable, and to Laura and Bill for their continued support. And thank you to Matthew Lombardo, for without you this would not be possible. And finally to Katharine Hepburn—Thank you, Kate."

Jane Farnol (Director) is delighted to return to The Brookfield Theatre for the Arts after having directed The Importance of Being Earnest here in 1996 and Twelfth Night in 1997. Jane, who currently resides in Kent, was born in England and trained at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts. Her New York acting credits include Brendan Behan's The Hostage at the Sheridan Square Playhouse, the chorus in The Trojan Women at Circle in the Square, and Ann in the Broadway production of Hail Scrawdyke! directed by Alan Arkin. At the American Shakespeare Festival Theatre in Connecticut, her roles ranged from Titania to Lady Macbeth. On television, Jane had recurring roles on The Guiding Light and As The World Turns. Jane's movie, The Colonial Naturalist, is shown as a permanent feature at Colonial Williamsburg. She was also Dave Garroway's assistant at WCBS Radio and the Executive Director of Lee Theodore's American Dance Machine. Regional directing credits: An Ideal Husband, Arms and the Man, Stepping Out, A Midsummer Night's Dream, The Lady's Not for Burning, The Taming of the Shrew, Hay Fever, The Man Who Came to Dinner, Gross Indecency, As You Like It, Holiday Memories, The Laramie Project, Medea, The Elephant Man, Ghost of a Chance, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Compleat Female Stage Beauty, The Philadelphia Story and Pygmalion.

Joseph Russo (Co-Director) most recently appeared as Freddy Eynsford-Hill in Pygmalion. Last year, Joseph directed Suddenly Last Summer at TheatreWorks. He is very pleased to have the opportunity to work again with Jane Farnol, having co-directed The Philadelphia Story with her at TheatreWorks in 2007. Stage credits include Beethoven in TheatreWorks' production of Dog Sees God, Sir Peter Lelly in Compleat Female Stage Beauty and Bob Cratchit in Ghost of a Chance. Joseph is currently furthering his training in Theatre and English at Western Connecticut

State University. A member of the New York Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences since 2007 and a playwright, Joseph's award-winning works have been seen at The Hartford Stage Company and the HBO Studios in New York City. Special thanks to his parents, Barbara, Jane, Bill, Noël and Katharine

Laura Gilbert (Stage Manager) is delighted to be working on *Tea At Five* once more, having stage managed its previous incarnations at Tri-Arts and The Sherman Playhouse. In addition to *Tea At Five*, Laura has stage managed productions of *Pygmalion*, *The Man Who Came to Dinner* and *Les Liaisons Dangereuses* for Jane. Most recently, Laura stage managed A *Little Night Music* at TheatreWorks.

Matthew Lombardo (Playwright) is the recipient of the IRNE Award for Best Solo Play for Tea At Five. The production premiered at Hartford Stage and moved to Off-Broadway at The Promenade Theatre. Mr. Lombardo's other Off-Broadway credits include directing the hit comedy End of the World Party at the 47th Street Theatre, Mother and Child at the McGinn/Cazale Theatre (with Tony Award winning actress Ann Wedgeworth) and Guilty Innocence with the Actor's Playhouse, serving the latter two productions as both playwright and director. Having written the television series Another World, Mr. Lombardo garnered a Writer's Guild Award nomination for Outstanding Achievement. His most recent collaboration with friend and mentor John Tillinger, a project about the life of Tallulah Bankhead entitled Looped, had its World Premiere at the Pasadena Playhouse featuring Valerie Harper. He dedicates Tea At Five to his mother, Julia, without whom there would be no words.

HEPBURN-ISMS:

- She was nominated for 12 Academy Awards in her lifetime and won four Best Actress Oscars, the greatest number in the Award's history.
- Despite her success at the Oscars, she never attended an Academy Awards ceremony as a nominee. Her only appearance was at the 1974 awards to present the Irving Thalberg Award to her friend Lawrence Weingarten. When she went onstage to a standing ovation, she said "I'm living proof that a person can wait forty-one years to be unselfish."
- She stole the script for Morning Glory off a producer's desk, convinced the role was written for her. She succeeded in convincing the producers as well and went on to win her first Oscar.
- A leading contender for Scarlett O'Hara in Gone with the Wind (1939), she later served as Maid of Honor at the wedding of Vivien Leigh and Laurence Olivier.
- She was obsessed with having fresh flowers in every room.
- She took numerous showers every day which fueled the legend that she refused to rent a house before trying the shower.
- If she lost a button, she replaced it with a large safety-pin.

- She did all her own stunts because the stunt woman never stood up straight enough.
- She refused to sign photographs, but would reply to fan mail.
- Her customary after-dinner position was sprawled out on her stomach—"helps the digestion."
- She began jogging at the age of 71 with Greta Garbo then 73.

QUOTES FROM KATE THE GREAT:

[When asked what star quality is] "It's either some kind of electricity or some kind of energy. I don't know what it is, but whatever it is, I've got it."

"I have loved and been in love. There is a big difference."

"If you always do what interests you, at least one person is pleased."

"If you want to give up the admiration of many men for the criticism of one, go ahead, get married."

"Isn't it fun getting older" is really a terrible fallacy. That's like saying, "I prefer driving an old car with a flat tire."

"Love has nothing to do with what you are expecting to get – only with what you are expecting to give – which is everything."

"People have grown fond of me, like some old building."

"Sometimes I wonder if men and women really suit each other. Perhaps they should live next door and just visit now and then."
