A Brief History of The Brookfield Theatre for the Arts

The building that houses BTA was originally a gymnasium for The Curtis School for Boys. First established in 1875 in Bethlehem, CT by Frederick S. Curtis, the school was moved to Long Meadow Hill in 1883 and then to the present site that was the former Goodsell Estate in 1886.

In 1906 the price for one school year was six hundred dollars. This included "tuition, board, a seat in church, lighting and worming, the care and mending of clothing, and the use of school books." In the 1920s, girls were allowed to enroll as day students. This is the second gymnasium for the Curtis School. The first was destroyed by fire in 1906. The present stone building was built in 1907. The Curtis School closed its doors in 1943.

The gymnasium was purchased by the Brookfield Country Players in 1957 and has been used as a theatre for year-round plays and musicals ever since. This year, 2015, is our 58th season.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Recently I was asked why I chose this play, *Steel Magnolias* to bring to the Brookfield stage. Honestly I don't think I chose but rather it chose me. Why? Two words—the story.

The story setting: It is a small town in the heart of a northern Louisiana Parish that is steeped in southern traditions. It is a place whose residents live and work and marry and raise families and die the best that they can. I suppose it is a bit of an ideal world, perhaps. Or maybe a slower paced world of talking face to face and writing letters if preferred over today's instant message and wifi world.

The story characters: The ladies of Chinquapin, or at least these six ladies, each so unique and colorful in their own special way. They each bring their special brand of humor, philosophy, sympathy and candor and form this beautiful bond of love and support for one another. Together they draw each other in as they draw us in. We not only relish being a fly on the wall to enjoy their banter, but they make us think about and relish the close family and friends that make up the fabric of our lives.

A play about women so carefully and lovingly crafted...by a man.

Robert Harling grew up in Natchitoches, La. and drew from his very personal life experiences to create this story. His family lived the richness and the tragedy and understood "laughter through tears" intimately. They lived with and understood the effects of diabetes not only on the person who is challenged by this disease, but by her family who cared for her until the day she lost her battle. It is told that Robert ranted and raved about the anger he felt over the loss of his sister to a playwright friend who just kept saying, "Write it down."

And so he did.

We are so very proud and honored to bring you this touching, funny, honest story of love, of friendship, of joy and sorrow, but mostly...of hope.

Joanne is an exhibiting member of many regional art associations and is on several State of Connecticut Art Committees.

Bruce and Joanne own The Art Spot, a Fine Arts School, teaching children and adults watercolor, pastels, oils and many other art techniques. Other programming includes Artist in Residence programming in schools through out the east coast.


