OUR HISTORY

The Country Players of Brookfield was founded in 1957 by Tillie Cicala and Dot French with an ad in the local newspaper asking, "Are you a ham?" They found many hams to join their ranks and their first play was produced in 1958. Plays were initially performed in church halls and school auditoriums. After a school complained about an actor appearing on stage with no shirt, it became clear that the band of players needed a home of its own. After refurbishing this building (originally the Curtis school gym built in 1907), it has been the permanent home of Brookfield's community theater. The organization eventually grew to include a wide range of cultural offerings and, in 2003, changed its name to "The Brookfield Theatre for the Arts, Inc." to reflect this commitment. At the same time, plans began for the building of a lobby annex to offer a gathering place for social events and concerts, and gallery space for art exhibits. The new lobby was dedicated in 2005. This year marks Brookfield's 65th year as an all-volunteer, non-profit organization providing quality live performances, cultural events, and educational workshops to the community. BIOGRAPHIES-CREATIVE



José Triana (Author) was born in Hatuey, Cuba. He emigrated to Spain in 1954 and studied acting at the Círculo de Bellas Artes de Madrid. He began writing plays while he was living in Spain and continued to do so when he returned to Cuba after the revolution. Triana won the Casa de las Américas prize in 1966 for LA NOCHE DE LOS ASESINOS. The play won him great praise and fame as a playwright but caused him to fall out of favour with the Cuban Ministry for

Culture as the play was received as a depiction of the ineptitude of Castro's government. Triana has lived in Paris since 1980.



Morgana Kate Watson (Cuca) could not be more excited to be returning to the Brookfield stage as Cuca. Most recently, she was seen as Millie in PERFECT ARRANGEMENT, at Theatreworks New Milford's MAN OF LA MANCHA doubling as Maria and the Flamenco dancer. IN THE GALLERY

NOW SHOWING in our lobby gallery: the artwork of Jeanne Steers.

Jeanne Steers is a professional artist and a graduate of RISD. She is the curator of Brookfield Theatre's gallery art shows.

Known for her dynamic and colorful paintings, Jeanne Steers works mainly in acrylic or wax oil crayon on shaped masonite board. Over the years her work on shaped board has evolved, the shaped canvas adding an additional dimension and element to the meaning of the piece. This third dimension adds depth while providing an unique framework for the art.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

I have a few heroes to introduce you to tonight. Sean, Morgana, and Lizzy won't leave the stage except for our short intermission. There are no scene changes and no fancy set or props to hide behind. This show is all them. There aren't words enough to describe how three people can put their whole selves into an ensemble with such passion and dedication. I'm so incredibly fortunate to have had the opportunity to watch them create this show for you. Thank you, thank you, thank you!

Thank you also to Lou Okell and the board of Brookfield Theatre for trusting me to direct this production. Although the allegories originated decades ago in Jose Triana's original Spanish script, the themes of family, loneliness, power, and love are ever present and just as real for all of us today. Thank you to Janice Gabriel for choreographing some of our physical content—I appreciate your concern for safety and your keen eye for the stage. Thank you to Stephen Cihanek for this gorgeous light design and for teaching me how to run the live feed. And a huge HUG and THANK YOU to my daughter and Stage Manager, Maya, on whom I depended for more than just Stage Managing, but also Assistant Directing, Costume and Makeup advice, Lighting Technician, snack helper, and anything else that may have randomly come up.

Directing NIGHT OF THE ASSASSINS has been something of an ear-worm for me over the past five years or so. I was first introduced to it back in 1991, when my professor, Kevin Dreyer, translated it from the original Spanish and staged it in the Black Box theatre at Notre Dame. The rhythm and passion he brought to life inside those four walls have haunted me ever since. Fast forward to when I returned to theatre in 2017 for BENT. I knew right away that Brookfield Theatre wasn't afraid to do something a little different—something that challenges the audience to participate and not merely observe. These shows are similar in that they aren't comfortable or easy to watch. I'm sorry to spoil it, but you aren't going to go home tonight singing a cute little ditty, feeling good about the world around you. The title pretty much gives that away, and if that doesn't, the show summary is your next clue.

You will be challenged. These three souls are challenged. Lalo, Cuca, and Beba, as you are soon to see, are acting out the events surrounding the murder of their parents. In this unnamed room in their house, they play all the parts—the nosey neighbors, the cops, their parents, and even each other. What reasons are capable of creating such a sense so as to impel one to an act of murder?
